Message from the President



Dear Probus Colleagues

The August Probus meeting was well attended with some 56 members participating. We received an emergency evacuation briefing from the CEO of the Kew Golf Club, Stephen Roberts. It was reassuring to know that the Kew Golf Club has well trained staff to act as wardens and guides in the event of an emergency. Our secretary, Vaughan Beck, advised us that the club is preparing to have a register of contact persons for use in case any of us has

medical emergency and a next-of-kin or friend needs to be contacted. The register will be voluntary and confidential to a few people responsible for organising our events. More details will be provided in upcoming newsletters once the management committee is satisfied that the appropriate protocols and safeguards are in place.

The guest speaker was Rev. Dr. Stuart Brooking. He informed us that the company, Local Leaders International, of which he is Executive Director, has a global reach dealing with Bible Colleges and Universities in about 90 countries. They provide financial support to train mainly young people to develop leadership skills to address major challenges in their societies in areas such as poverty, education and housing. More than 50 years as a radiographer with 10 years out caring for four children, her contribution to the Royal Children's Hospital represents a very significant contribution to society. Profile Talk – Bev McGree



Bev grew up in Echuca and moved to Melbourne at 18 years to study radiography at Prince Henry's Hospital and R.M.I.T. After three years qualifying, she then worked at the Royal Children's and Mercy Maternity hospitals. She also worked in London for a few months until her eldest son was born. She then had a 10 year break while her four

children were young. On moving back to Melbourne from Adelaide, she re-commenced work as a part time radiographer at the Royal Children's Hospital and continued there for the next 40 years until she retired in June last year.

Bev saw many technological changes over that time including the introduction of Ultrasound, CT, Image Intensifiers and MRI. Radiography went from catching images on film to digital images on computer screens.

She has enjoyed travelling around both Australia and overseas in recent years, and is now looking forward to enjoying her retirement.

Speaker for the September Meeting



Professor Peter Doherty will speak on Viruses and Immunity

Peter Doherty trained initially as a veterinarian and spent 10 years in Brisbane, then Edinburgh, working as a pathologist/ neuropathologist researching infectious diseases of domestic animals. Aiming to learn basic immunology, he then took a temporary appointment at the John Curtin School of Medical Research, Canberra, where,

working with a younger Swiss colleague, Rolf Zinkernagel, they made a chance discovery that explained the biological role of the Major Histocompatibility Complex and the nature of immunological surveillance.

As a consequence, he spent the rest of his 60-year career as an MD, a mouse doctor, researching CD8+ 'killer' T cell-mediated-immunity in the USA and Australia. Zinkernagel and Doherty were awarded the 1996 Nobel Prize for Medicine for their 'discoveries concerning the cellular immune defence'. At the University of Melbourne since 2002, he has also been heavily involved in public science communication and has published seven 'lay' books on science and the scientific life.



Report on August Visit – ANZ Banking Museum



The eight of us who joined the ANZ banking museum were rewarded with a marvellous tour. We were able to admire the beautifully restored ceiling in the banking chambers. Then our guide Allan took us upstairs to the apartment built for the manager of this ES&A bank, as it originally was, in the 1880's. There were 17 rooms of which we saw about five. What treasures they held. The rooms were huge and still furnished. The double glazing on all the windows kept out all the sounds of Collins Street which was still a dusty dirt road when it was built. There is a large collection of paintings which were well worth inspection.

As the Stock Exchange used to be next door some of that building was incorporated into the bank and the trading floor became a restaurant, so we were able to see some of that.



While there was not enough time to look at everything at the museum, the large collection of money boxes was of considerable interest. It would be certainly worth another visit to look the rest of the material on display. Apparently, this part of the bank can be visited anytime.

All of us then went to the Mercato for lunch and were able to choose a variety of different dishes which everyone thoroughly enjoyed.

Getaway Lakes Entrance November 2025

Colin and Susan have just returned from overseas and will be attending all Probus meetings until the Getaway to Lakes Entrance on the 17th-21st November. They look forward to any queries you may have and hope you can join them on this relaxing Getaway. The timeline and numbers at this stage are as follows:

- 1. Accommodation bookings for those attending need to be made ASAP (if not already done so) at the Bellevue On The Lakes, quoting reservation number 1717761. A \$100 deposit is required on booking with the remaining payment due 60 days prior to arrival (i.e. by the 18th September 2025)
- 2. After the 18th September we will use those booked attendance numbers, (including your indication about travelling by coach to the Getaway) to calculate the amount to be paid by each attendee to the club. This can be done so that you will know this amount by the October

14th Probus Meeting. This should then be paid to the Treasurer by the 28th October (2 weeks later). This payment will cover travel to the getaway for those using the coach, 4 breakfasts and dinners, the 2 lakes cruises including the lunch on the Metung Cruise (at the Metung Hotel Tuesday), the coach travel for all attendees on the Wednesday, including a packed lunch and a wine tasting, and a packed lunch for the Paynesville cruise Thursday 9:30am-12:30pm.

- N.B. Lunches and/or tea/ coffee on the way to and from the Getaway in the La Trobe Valley will be at own cost.


Cultural Matters – Review by Mary Sutherland Ronald Blythe – Celebrating Humanity



Ronald Blythe was an English writer who wrote insightfully about life in communities in rural Suffolk, and on the margins. His subject was always ordinary people in their context. He died just after his 100th birthday in 2022 still living at Bottengoms, his inaccessible Elizabethan yeoman's farmhouse near the river Stour, supported by devoted friends.

His first book "Akenfield" (1969) was a series of interviews with people in a Suffolk village recalling massive changes between 1900 and 1960 when the mechanical agricultural revolution changed rural life entirely. By this time there were fewer people working the land and cars, television and

commuters had arrived, Voices recorded here were not usually heard in literature, and it was regarded as a ground- breaking book.



In "The View in Winter" (1979) we hear the voices of old people in Britain in this changed world which didn't value them. Nobody sees them anymore as they see themselves. These themes are universal in our modern world, and Blythe considered this his best book. He found that old people who thrived were those "who were able to preserve their spiritual vitality, vividness and imaginative sort of energy".

His "Letters from Wormingford" were written at Bottengoms, and were weekly reflections on the seasons of country life, following the seasons of the church. They have given us much pleasure over the years.

Blythe is reticent about his Christian faith, but as a lay reader he deputised for the vicar in three small rural parishes. Each letter reflects on something of local or wider

interest, often tiny things like a flint arrowhead left by a much earlier walker in that place. Connections are made and interesting memories are shared. They are perfect little vignettes of how people's lives go on, despite immense changes, as they have over so many centuries in that place. It is a gentle reminder in these fast-changing times!
